
Ash Wednesday

Ash Wednesday begins Lent, the church's 40-day journey of repentance and renewal in preparation for Holy Week. Because of its unique character and place in the church calendar, we celebrate Ash Wednesday as a separate festival. Because it is an important festival, the order of Holy Communion serves as the liturgy. However, the music of the liturgy is restrained: "Glory Be to God on High," "Alleluia," are omitted.

CONFESSION OF SINS

- M: Beloved in the Lord: let us draw near with a true heart and confess our sins to God our Father, asking him in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ to grant us forgiveness.
- C: Holy and merciful Father, I confess that I am by nature sinful and that I have disobeyed you in my thoughts, words, and actions. I have done what is evil and failed to do what is good. For this I deserve your punishment both now and in eternity. But I am truly sorry for my sins, and trusting in my Savior Jesus Christ, I pray; Lord, have mercy on me, a sinner.
- M: God, our heavenly Father, has been merciful to us and has given his only Son to be the atoning sacrifice for our sins. Therefore, as a called servant of Christ and by his authority, I forgive you all your sins in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit.

C: Amen.

PRAYER

Prayer of the Day

M: The Lord be with you.

C: And also with you.

M: Let us pray.

Almighty and merciful God, you never despise what you have made and always forgive those who turn to you. Create in us such new and contrite hearts that we may truly repent of our sins and obtain your full and gracious pardon; through your Son, Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever.

THE WORD

First Lesson Numbers 21:4-9

Only sin can turn a gift as gracious as manna into something detestable. Only sin could lead a people to speak against the God who had worked such mighty miracles for them. So God worked another miracle—one meant to cause the people to return to him. The venomous bites of the snakes brought God's people to their knees in

repentance, and God quickly offered pardon and safety with a type of Christ. Notice that the people asked that God remove the snakes, but the snakes stayed. The Lord chastises those he loves. Notice, too, that this is the last complaint of God's people until they entered the Promised Land!

⁴ They traveled from Mount Hor along the route to the Red Sea, [a] to go around Edom. But the people grew impatient on the way; ⁵ they spoke against God and against Moses, and said, "Why have you brought us up out of Egypt to die in the wilderness? There is no bread! There is no water! And we detest this miserable food!"

⁶Then the LORD sent venomous snakes among them; they bit the people and many Israelites died. ⁷The people came to Moses and said, "We sinned when we spoke against the LORD and against you. Pray that the LORD will take the snakes away from us." So Moses prayed for the people.

⁸ The LORD said to Moses, "Make a snake and put it up on a pole; anyone who is bitten can look at it and live." ⁹ So Moses made a bronze snake and put it up on a pole. Then when anyone was bitten by a snake and looked at the bronze snake, they lived. (NIV)

Second Lesson 2 Corinthians 7:8-13a

God wants us to have godly sorrow over sin that leads to salvation. Godly sorrow brings repentance, not regret. Worldly sorrow leads only to regret that binds and imprisons us in our past sins. Godly sorrow leads to repentance that opens the prison doors and sets us free from the past, free to return to God, free to sin no more.

⁸ Even if I caused you sorrow by my letter, I do not regret it. Though I did regret it—I see that my letter hurt you, but only for a little while—⁹ yet now I am happy, not because you were made sorry, but because your sorrow led you to repentance. For you became sorrowful as God intended and so were not harmed in any way by us. ¹⁰ Godly sorrow brings repentance that leads to salvation and leaves no regret, but worldly sorrow brings death. ¹¹ See what this godly sorrow has produced in you: what earnestness, what eagerness to clear yourselves, what indignation, what alarm, what longing, what concern, what readiness to see justice done. At every point you have proved yourselves to be innocent in this matter. ¹² So even though I wrote to you, it was neither on account of the one who did the wrong nor on account of the injured party, but rather that before God you could see for yourselves how devoted to us you are. ¹³ By all this we are encouraged. (NIV)

Verse of the Day

M: Return to the LORD, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love. (Joel 2:13)

Gospel Luke 18:9-14

The Lenten call to repentance and renewal begins by addressing the sin in man. Sin drives a man to two extremes: pride and despair. The tax collector had to wear his sin in society like a scarlet letter. The Pharisee hid his guilt beneath a veneer of righteousness. Which man has more to teach us? We have a such high opinion of our own righteousness! We may fool our friends; we may even fool our family. But the ashes on our head remind us that we will meet God, and he is not fooled by our shined-up exterior. He can see the depravity and decay within. The man who understands this beats his breast and cries, *Kyrie eleison!* That man returns to the Lord and finds justification in Christ, pardon from his forgiving God, and real righteousness.


⁹ To some who were confident of their own righteousness and looked down on everyone else, Jesus told this parable: ¹⁰ "Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. ¹¹ The Pharisee stood by himself and prayed: 'God, I thank you that I am not like other people—robbers, evildoers, adulterers—or even like this tax collector. ¹² I fast twice a week and give a tenth of all I get.'

¹³ "But the tax collector stood at a distance. He would not even look up to heaven, but beat his breast and said, 'God, have mercy on me, a sinner.'

¹⁴ "I tell you that this man, rather than the other, went home justified before God. For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

Instructions for the Beginning of Lent Psalm 130

(read in unison)

Out of the depths I cry to you, O Lord;

O Lord, hear my voice.

Let your ears be attentive

to my cry for mercy.

If you, O Lord, kept a record of sins,

O Lord, who could stand?

But with you there is forgiveness;

therefore you are feared.

I wait for the Lord and in his Word I put my hope.

My soul waits for the Lord more than watchmen wait for the morning.

O Israel, put your hope in the Lord,

for with the Lord is unfailing love and with him is full redemption.

M: Brothers and sisters: God created us to experience joy in communion with him, to love all people, and to live in harmony with his creation. But sin separates us from God, mars our relationship with one another, and brings ruin to God's good creation, and so we do not enjoy the life our Creator intended for us. Moreover, by our sin we grieve our Father, who does not desire us to come under his judgment, but to turn to him and live.

As disciples of the Lord Jesus Christ, we are called to struggle against everything that leads us away from loving God and our neighbor. Repentance, self-denial, prayer, and works of love – the disciplines of Lent – help us wage our spiritual warfare. I invite you, therefore, to commit yourselves anew to this struggle, asking our Father for strength to persevere in your Lenten discipline.

Responsive Prayer for Ash Wednesday

- M: Holy and righteous God, as we begin again the solemn spiritual journey of Lent, we come before you in deep humility. We confess that we are sinners, both by the nature we inherit and by the sinful thoughts, words, and actions that nature produces. Because of our sins, we deserve only your wrath and punishment. Yet you reveal yourself, not only as a God of holiness and justice but as a God of mercy and love. Despairing of our own merits and worthiness and in response to your gracious invitation, we come pleading for your forgiveness.
- C: Lord, have mercy on us for your holy name's sake.
- M: You have revealed your love and mercy for us sinners in Jesus Christ, your Son, our Savior. You sent him into our world to be the atoning sacrifice for the sins of all people. Help us grasp by faith the great truth that the pain and suffering, the mockery and ridicule, and the death and punishment he endured should have been ours. Help us understand that in incomprehensible love he suffered and died for us.
- C: Lord, have mercy on us for Jesus' sake.
- M: In silent meditation let us reflect on our sins, praise our Savior for the forgiveness he has won for us, and ask for God's continued grace to remove any doubt that we are forgiven.

Time for silent meditation follows.

- M: God of grace and mercy, may your Spirit continue to be with us as we follow the way of the cross. As we contemplate the story of our Savior's passion, build us up in our faith. Renew in us the zeal to serve you by reflecting your love in our lives. Give us the desire and the ability to boldly proclaim the grace in which we stand, so that all for whom you lived and died may join us in fellowship now and in your presence forever.
- C: We offer our humble thanks and praise, our prayers and petitions, and ourselves in body and spirit to you, Lord God. Hear us, according to your promise, for Jesus' sake. Amen.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name, thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. The Lord make his face shine on you and be gracious to you.


