Resurrection Comfort

Terri Ann Compton was born November 29, 1959, to Phyllis (Wagner), and the late Frederick "Fritz" Natzke. She was baptized into Christ on December 20, 1959 at Morrison Zion Lutheran Church. On April 15, 1973 she was confirmed in her faith at Morrison Zion. Her confirmation verse was Joshua 1:9: Be strong and courageous.
